Ingela Ihrman's exhibition *Frutti di Mare* embraces the story of how the first life on earth once emerged from the depths of the ocean. With humour and visual ingenuity, the title transforms the open architecture and dough-coloured wooden floor of the konsthall into a giant pizza, topped with around twenty works from the last 10 years of Ihrman's life as an artist in Malmö. The exhibition is alive and transforms through different happenings and performances. The map you hold in your hands guides you through the works in the space and lists the dates and times of the exhibition programme. In the konsthall's audio guide you can hear Ihrman talk about her works.

With a disarming sense of playfulness, Ingela Ihrman's artistic practice deals with the conditions of human existence. Social relations, scientific facts and personal experiences function as starting points for artistic exploration. The works refer to modern society and humankind's complicated relationship with itself and other living beings. Ihrman ruminates over the imbalance that has been in play since humanity began to separate itself from its surroundings and place itself above all other life. She delves into pleasure and pain, loneliness and autonomy, being – as the artist herself puts it – “human, social, in love or just alive”. In the exhibition, complex questions surrounding belonging, origin and reproduction culminate.

Frutti di Mare comprises of sculpture, video, installation, text and performance. On several occasions, the artist will dress up in sculptural costumes, pretending to be a passionflower, giant otter, frog, spruce cone, giant water lily or an oilbird with its nestling. The figures behave in their characteristic and idiosyncratic ways – they emit scents, excrete fluids, give birth, feed and reproduce. A connection to feminist performance can be found in these works – the body is concealed, and an objectifying gaze is redirected, but equally relevant is the human search for meaning and connection through rituals and ceremonies. The collective nature of the situation and experience is emphasized when visitors to the konsthall are invited to drink the sweet juices of the *Green Juice Bar* and *Passionflower*, or when the sickening death-smell of the flowering titan arum, impossible to escape, spreads through the room.

During a week in November, six actors from Ögonblicksteatern in Umeå will perform *Vilka är ni?* (Who are you?) for visitors of the konsthall. Ingela Ihrman has written the theatre play and created the costumes and scenography in close collaboration with director and playwright Maja Salomonsson. Together with the audience – the pike, the wood mouse, the blade of grass, the starflower, the blow fly and the pinecone all reflect upon what it means to be someone or something, and ask – who actually plays a role?

The wooden pier that crosses through the gallery space leads out to *The Inner Ocean* – a project in many parts that establishes links between the intertidal zone of the Andaman Islands and the Seved neighbourhood of Malmö. The group of works are intersected by geology, fertility research, posthumanism and bathtub hours in the semi-tiled bathroom of the artist's apartment. The title refers to the fluid that surrounds mature egg cells in the egg sacs of all terrestrial organisms. The fluid has the same salinity as the primeval ocean, where life once emerged billions of years ago. In this way, says Ihrman who loves to swim, we still carry the sea inside our bodies.

Frutti di Mare literally means fruits of the sea. In Italian, it refers to shellfish – marine invertebrates with exoskeletons. In a similar way, Ihrman's cumbersome handmade costumes act as protective armour around a vulnerable interior – an extra layer of skin and flesh that encapsulates and hides the contours of the body, allowing the artist to be visible and invisible at the same time. The execution is precise and the materials are simple; found or recycled. The costumes can be seen in different stages – dressed or resting, budding, lying on the floor or hanging on a hook. By leaving traces and energies of what has or has not yet happened, Ihrman reminds us of the cyclical nature of life and that the art space is not a freezer box where time stands still.

A Great Seaweed Day 2019

A group of sculptures inspired by algae found at the bridge pier in Malmö, on the Koster Islands, the Isle of Egg in Scotland and by the Baltic Sea. In the project, the flora of the sea is linked with the flora of the stomach – a sore point where energy flows and emotions converge.

5.1 Forkweed

Cotton, flour glue, wood glue, polyethylene plastic, textile paint, boat varnish, carbon fibre rod.

5.2 Oarweed

Foam rubber, acrylic paint, plastic wire.

5.3 Gutweed

Silk, textile dye, cotton, flour glue, wood glue, nylon thread, foam rubber.

5.4 Red Rags & Sea Lettuce

Cotton, polyester, textile paint, sealant.

6 Oilbird with Nesting 2021. HD-video, 6 min

Video and performance with a bird costume and nesting made from reeds, metal wire netting, paper clay, linseed oil paint, textiles, wool, wadding, plastic, wood, foam rubber and a dog toy.

The oilbird is a nocturnal fruit-eating species that nests in caves. The nestlings develop slowly and are very fat. People used to collect and cook the young to extract fat for their oil lamps. Nests in the deepest parts of the cave were left untouched because a curse was said to rest there. With thanks to Frida Peterson.
